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Homelessness isn't experienced equally

Specific risks

Disabled people, survivors of domestic abuse/VAWDASV, refugees, LGBTQ+, single parents, children, single men...

Without equality lens

Risk of repeated homelessness



Core equality considerations

- Data: robust equality evidence
- Location and safety: access, safety, networks
 Affordability: sustainable tenancies
- Tailored support: intersectional & multiagency



Rapid Rehousing in a Nation of Sanctuary

- Home Office asylum dispersal to all 22 LAs (varying numbers)
- 28/56-day move on
- uneven approach to dispersal support
- NoS and integration from day one



Move on and ending homelessness

Move on as an almost inevitable pathway into homelessness

Move on outcomes 28 vs 56 days		
TA	77%	68%
PRS	11%	19%
Street homelessness +	11%	9%





- short move on
- high expectations
- lack of knowledge of rights and systems
- no savings or networks



Opportunities for Rapid Rehousing

- Data and figures (Home Office)
- Early engagement examples of good practice
- Varying support needs, but many with low
- 'Housing ready' to 'housing is ready'
- Housing for integration and community cohesion
